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Piccadilly Park Park-and-Ride Lot Additional \$130,000 Grant

Valley Regional Transit approved the city's request for additional grant funds to supplement the \$800,000 grant already received. The funds will be used to complete the Park-and-Ride lot being constructed in Piccadilly Park. The parking lot was scheduled to be paved November 21 and 22, 2017, weather permitting.

New Elementary School

Students in Middleton School District are bursting district facilities at the seams, portable units are being used at two of the three elementary schools. The school board acknowledges the continued population growth forecasted in the Treasure Valley and in Middleton.

The school district authorized construction drawings be prepared for a new elementary school to be built on approximately 15 acres donated to the district about 10 years ago. The site is at the south end of Crossing Ave, which intersects with Purple Sage Road approximately one-half mile east of Cemetery Road, and one-half mile west of Middleton Road.

The city Planning and Zoning Commission approved the site plan and design review for the new school. Once construction drawings are prepared, the school district can prepare a cost estimate and seek voter approval of construction funds in March 2017. If approved, construction will commence in 2018 so the school will be open in August 2019.

Gun Discharge in Town

Bird-hunting season started, and ends January 31, 2018. Middleton City Code Title 10, Chapter 2, Section 2 (10-2-2) recognizes the U.S. Constitutional right of residents to bear arms (possess and legally use a firearm). A gun may be discharged legally in city limits with the following restriction.

Any person who recklessly discharges any firearms or weapons within the limits of the city shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. "Recklessly" means conduct which shows a willful and wanton disregard for the safety or property of others and which may cause bodily injury or death to persons or domestic animals or damage to the property of others.

Christmas Parade December - Downtown Middleton

The Middleton Chamber of Commerce will be hosting the Annual Christmas Parade on Saturday, December 9, 2017. The parade will begin at 4:30pm. Other activities include a coloring contest for the kids, and cookie making contest for all ages. Visit the Trolley Station to warm up with hot chocolate and cookies as you share your wish list with Santa.

Snow Removal Priority

In preparation for another heavy snow year, the city has been stock piling sand for intersections and preparing the plow and grader to assist with snow removal. City street maintenance staff will begin clearing snow and sanding intersections when accumulation on roadways is at two inches and is coupled with freezing temperatures.

A plowing priority schedule has been put in place to get kids to school, residents to work and clear access for emergency and first responders. City Staff, Middleton Police and Middleton Fire will be meeting on a weekly basis beginning mid-November to discuss problem areas and make priority adjustments.

Priority No. 3: Subdivision Streets

Although subdivision streets important they will be plowed after priority 1 and 2 streets have been cleared. When snow is cleared from the streets residents will be responsible to clear in front of their driveways and mailboxes for timely garbage pick-up and mail delivery.

Sidewalks: Residents are responsible to clear sidewalks and fire hydrants in front of their homes. The City will clear sidewalks and pathyways around city buildings, business owners are responsible to clear around their business.

Leave water running a trickle from inside faucets. If you notice a water-meter lid has slipped or come off, contact Lead Water Operator James Askew at 208-631-8537 to re-secure the lid to avoid freezing water meters and pipes.

RV Dump Complete



The city installed an RV dump and water-fill station on King Ave east of Pioneer Federal Credit Union near the pathway connecting Roadside Park to the Boise River. The station is available to anyone without charge. Dumping hazardous materials is strictly prohibited by federal and state law, and the city is required to report all illicit discharges for prosecution. River District (shown on next page)

The River District consists of the area between the Boise River and State Highway 44, and between Emmett Road on the west and Duff Lane on the east. The River District Concept Plan intends to account for landowners and how they would like to use their properties while improving livability, walkability and health in Middleton.

The River District Concept Plan was reviewed by floodplain and wetland experts and has been given a preliminary thumbs-up. Wildlife habitat areas shown in light brown are intermixed with Phases 2 and 3 of the Mill Slough Water Quality Plan, shown in light orange. A radio control airplane park was added south of the future sports field about one-half mile east of Middleton Road and one-half mile south of Highway 44.

Epic swings were added along the Boise River rather than picnic tables so far from parking. A four-acre dog park is at the west end of the park near the parking lot. A chain-link fence will be around the perimeter and through the middle of the dog park. This will allow half of the park to be used at a time while the groundcover on the other half rests and groundcover restores.

We want you to know, brave people continue the fight to preserve independence from corruption and tyranny. Thank you. Because of you, Life is Better Here.



New Law Prohibiting Harassment, Intimidation and Bullying

The City of Middleton recognizes the rights of individuals guaranteed under the laws and constitution of Idaho, and take steps to deter instances of harassment, intimidation and bullying, which is a primary cause depression.

Depression is without question the most common reason people commit suicide, and suicide is a leading cause of death in the United States. Severe depression is always accompanied by a pervasive sense of suffering as well as the belief escape from it is hopeless. The pain of existence often becomes too much for severely depressed people to bear.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), in 2015:

- 1. Suicide was the tenth leading cause of death overall in the United States, claiming the lives of more than 44,000 people.
- 2. Suicide was the third leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 10 and 14, and the second leading cause of death among individuals between the ages of 15 and 34.
- 3. There were more than twice as many suicides (44,193) in the United States as there were homicides (17,793).
- "Suicide" means death caused by self-directed injurious behavior with intent to die as a result of the behavior.
- "Suicide attempt" means a non-fatal, self-directed, potentially injurious behavior with intent to die as a result of the behavior. A suicide attempt might not result in injury.
- "Suicidal ideation" means thinking about, considering, or planning suicide.

The Mayor and City Council are scheduled on December 6, 2017 to consider passing the following law:

WHEREAS, the City of Middleton is authorized by State law to regulate nuisances within the City limits;

WHEREAS, Idaho Code 67-5901 secures freedom from discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin or disability in connection with employment, public accommodations, and real property transactions, discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin in connection with education, discrimination because of age in connection with employment, and thereby to protect their interest in personal dignity, to make available to the state their full productive capacities, to secure the state against domestic strife and unrest, to preserve the public safety, health, and general welfare, and to promote the interests, rights and privileges of individuals within the state;

WHEREAS, suicide in the United States and Idaho is a leading cause of death among teenagers;

WHEREAS, Idaho Code 18-917(A) prohibits one student or minor present on school property or at school activities from harassing, intimidating or bullying another student;

WHEREAS, Idaho Code 18-7902 prohibits the malicious and intentional intimidation or harassment of another person because of that person's race, color, religion, ancestry, or national origin; and

WHEREAS, the City of Middleton desires to prohibit harassment, intimidation or bullying of any individual for any reason, not just in the employment and real property transactions, not just a student on school grounds, and not just harassment because of a person's race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or disability.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MIDDLETON, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION OR BULLYING means inflicting or attempting to inflict psychological or emotional humiliation, intimidation, harassment, mischievousness, abuse or harm to an individual.

New Section 8-1-20: It shall be unlawful to harass, intimidate or bully an individual.
